Dear Friends of St. Ignatius Church
Happy Feast Day of the Resurrection of
our Lord!

*"He has risen from the dead, and he is
going before you to Galilee; there you will
see him." (Matthew 28:7b)*

My name is Toshiaki Koso, and I have
been recently appointed to succeed Fr.
Saturnino Ochoa as Pastor. I was born
in 1947 on the island of Nomi (now the
city of Etajima) in the Seto Inland Sea in
Hiroshima Prefecture. In the spring of
March 1967, I entered the Jesuit Novitiate
in Nagatsuka, a suburb of Hiroshima City,
and on March 19, 1977, at the age of
30, I was ordained a priest at the former
St. Ignatius Church (Tokyo) by Cardinal

Seiichi Shirayanagi.

My family is of Akimonto(安芸門徒)
descent, but I first came into contact with
Catholicism when I entered Hiroshima
Gakuin Junior and Senior High School. The
elementary school I attended for six years
was just across the Memorial Cathedral
for World Peace. The bell ringing from
the church at noon for the Angelus was a
signal for me that lunch time had arrived.

On June 18, 1961, when I was in my
third year of junior high school, I was
baptized together with seven other
students in Hiroshima Gakuin by the
Spanish missionary Luis P. Ledesma.
When I told Fr. Ledesma that I would
choose Ignatius as my baptismal saint,
he was overjoyed for some reason. I told
him that I meant to say "St. Ignatius of
Antioch" (the Feast Day at that time was
February 1), but he took it as "St. Ignatius
of Loyola."

So I looked again to find out who
"Ignatius" was and what he had done in
his lifetime to make Fr. Ledesma so happy.
This was my encounter with none other
than the founder of the Jesuits himself.
The baptismal name was also transferred
through this connection, and I wondered
if St. Ignatius of Loyola has drawn me to
him this time as well.

At the end of March this year, I retired
as President of the University of the
Sacred Heart, Tokyo. Prior to that, I served
at Sophia University for nearly 40 years as
a faculty member in the Department of
Education. During that time, in April 1999,
I took over the position of Chancellor of
Sophia School Corporation from Fr. Joji

Yamamoto and served until March 2018.

One of the most unforgettable
memories was in 2013, when Sophia
University celebrated the 100th
Anniversary of its Foundation and we
held the commemorative Mass in the
main chapel of St. Ignatius Church on
November 1 (Feast of all Saints). The main
celebrant was Cardinal Raffaele Farina,
Special Representative of Pope Francis,
who had come from Rome. St. Ignatius
Church was full for the Commemoration
Mass.

Although I am not as experienced as Fr.
Hermann Heuvers, Fr. Joji Yamamoto, Fr.
Luis Cangas, and other priests of the past,
I will do my very best as your new Pastor
and would appreciate your support and
cooperation.

At this time we are also transitioning to
a super-smart society (Society 5.0) which
is difficult to predict. Pandemics, warfare,
major earthquakes, climate change, and
other global environmental issues are
prompting us to change the way we have
lived and the structure of society. Let us
pray together and strive together to make
St. Ignatius Church a "Galilee" where we
can meet "the Risen One from the dead"
and awaken to a new way of life and live
in the fellowship of new life.

POPE FRANCIS' TOP QUOTES ON EASTER

1. Easter is the feast of hope

"Dear sister, dear brother, even if in your heart you have buried hope, do not give up: God is greater. Darkness and death do not have the last word. Be strong, for with God nothing is lost!" (Homily, April 2020)

2. Easter celebrates the glory of love not of applause and audiences

"At Easter, God finally reveals his glory. He takes away the last veil and astonishes us as never before. We discover, in fact, that God's glory is all love: pure love, mad and unthinkable, beyond every limit and measure... True glory is the glory of love, because it is the only one that gives life to the world. Certainly, this glory is the opposite of worldly glory, which comes when one is admired, praised, or acclaimed. The glory of God, on the other hand, is paradoxical: no applause, no audience. At the center there is not the ego, but the other. (Angelus, April 2019)

3. Easter is the feast of tombstones rolled away

"Why do you think that everything is hopeless, that no one can take away your tombstones? Why do you give in to resignation and failure? Easter is the feast of tombstones taken away--rocks rolled aside. God takes away even the hardest stones hiding our hopes and expectations. Easter is the exodus to love and goodness.

"This is what Easter is: it is the exodus, the passage of human beings from slavery to sin and evil to the freedom of love and goodness. Because God is life, life alone, and we are his glory: the living man." (Easter message, March 31, 2013)

4. Easter brought radical news for all the world

"Easter is the event that brought radical news for every human being, for history and for the world: the triumph of life over death. It is the feast of reawakening and of rebirth. Let us allow our lives to be conquered and transformed by the Resurrection!" (Regina Caeli, April 6, 2015)

5. To celebrate Easter is to allow Jesus to triumph

"To celebrate Easter is to believe once more that God constantly breaks into our personal histories, challenging our "conventions," those fixed ways of thinking and acting that end up paralyzing us. To celebrate Easter is to allow Jesus to triumph over the craven fear that so often assails us and tries to bury every kind of hope." (Homily, March 31, 2018)



6. Easter sacraments renew our life and our relationships

"The grace contained in the Sacraments of Easter (Baptism and Communion) is an enormous potential for the renewal of our personal existence, of family life, of social relations. However, everything passes through the human heart. If I let myself be touched by the grace of the Risen Christ, if I let him change me in that aspect of mine which is not good, which can hurt me and others, I allow the victory of Christ to be affirmed in my life, to broaden its beneficial action." (Regina Caeli, April 1, 2013)

7. We are a people of hope

"Let us not quench the wavering flame (cf. Is 42:3) that never falters and let us allow hope to be rekindled." (Blessing to the City and the World, March 27, 2020)

Ordination to the Diaconate

Two young Japanese Jesuits, Francis Assisi Kōtarō Mori (森 晃太郎) and John Baptist Tetsurō Watanabe SJ (渡辺 徹郎) were ordained Deacons by the Archbishop of Tokyo, Tarcisius Isao Kikuchi, SVD. The ceremony was held on March 11 in St. Mary's Chapel, the first since pandemic restrictions were eased. Deacon Mori currently works for young people and promotion of vocations, while Deacon Watanabe assists at the Jesuit China Center in Tokyo. The date for their ordination to the priesthood is set for September 23. They will be part of the delegation who will attend the World Youth Day in Portugal.

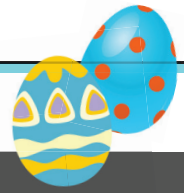
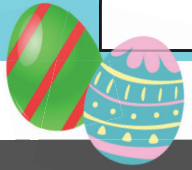
